Every fall, community members, Masonic Leaders, and their families gather together to spend time at the Masonic Villages to learn about what they have to offer, and to promote the programs of the Masonic family. Food and entertainment are available to ensure that everyone enjoys their visit.

On October 7th, at the Masonic Village in Sewickley, PA, the Community Day Festival will be held. This gathering helps introduce the Masonic Family to the Pittsburgh community. Entertainment, food, crafts and more will be available for a small fee. Members of the Masonic Youth Groups will be present to promote their programming.

Two weeks later, on October 21st, the Masonic Village in Elizabethtown will host a similar event called Autumn Day.

Members from Masonic Organizations and Youth Groups gather to promote their programs as well. Tables are set up for promotional purposes as well as entertainment. Rainbow girls help young attendees create their own crown and provide them with face paint. Job's Daughters host a series of games geared to the youth attendees as well as coloring activities. chance to assist at the Health Care Center. DeMolay members will help in the efforts to clean up tables and chairs at the end of the program. A blood drive is also available for anyone to donate blood, something many members of the youth groups are known to do as well.

Both festivals are great opportunities to socialize within the Masonic Community and learn about programs you may not have known about. Everyone is invited to join in, so make sure you're there.

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
Helping Rainbow Find Their Princess

Masonic Youth Groups Provide Charity To Others

One of the many things that sets Freemasonry apart from other organizations is its charitable presence in our communities. Lodges donate thousands of dollars to charitable causes every year. That same enthusiasm for helping others has been embraced by the Masonic Youth Groups, as they all work hard to raise funds for various charities in Pennsylvania.

Rainbow Girls hold two charity programs per year. The Grand Worthy Advisor selects a charity during her term, which is mostly supported through the purchase of the Grand Worthy Advisor's pin. Last year this



charity was the Special Olympics; this year it's the Animal Rescue League. The other charity, the state charity that stays consistent each year, is the My Stuff Bags program, which is designed to create bags for children going through tough times in their lives to make them feel comfortable and happy. The girl who serves as Grand Charity is responsible for providing programming to support this charity.

DeMolay supports various charities from chapter to chapter, but the state charity remains the Scottish Rite Children's Dyslexia Centers. The Dyslexia Centers are in various locations throughout Pennsylvania so chapters can support their local center. The State Sweetheart and a member of the Elected State Officers are responsible for seeing that all chapters participate in the State Charity. One of the most successful events is Elizabethtown Chapter's annual Dodgeball for Dyslexia tournament.

The Job's Daughters of Pennsylvania support the H.I.K.E program, which stands for the Hearing Impaired Kids Endowment Fund. This charity helps provide hearing devices for children with hearing impairments through the ages of newborn and twenty.



LifeSkills Conference 2018



The 2017 LifeSkills program wrapped up a little over a month ago, but it is never too early to start thinking about next year. Every July in Elizabethtown at the Masonic Conference Center—Patton Campus, the Pennsylvania Masonic Youth Foundation sponsors the LifeSkills program. Youth from local communities, school districts and Masonic Youth Groups gather together to learn lifelong lessons that will help make them a better overall person and a leader in society. The program is about teaching an adolescent how to handle themselves as a person and how to contribute back to society in a positive way. It provides activities that help youth members become better in areas

such as teamwork, problem solving, leadership, trust and respect.

The LifeSkills program is for youth from the age of 12 to 16. The LifeChangers program, a chance for older teens to look a little deeper into the LifeSkills concepts, is for young adults 17 to 21. Both programs provide activities that will challenge each individual mentally and, in some cases, physically.

Next year, the week long activities are scheduled for July 22-27, 2018. Has your lodge sponsored a participant of the LifeSkills program? If so, we thank you and hope you will again this year. Make a Nomination for the HODEGOS



The HODEGOS Award is given by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania to up to two deserving Adult Leaders of each of the Masonic Youth Organizations in Pennsylvania; Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay. The emblem of the honor is a solid gold lapel pin (or necklace for the ladies) molded with the Greek word HODEGOS, which translates to mean "the driver", but in today's context it means mentor and teacher. Created in 2005, the award is given for outstanding service to the

respective youth group they represent, with nominations coming from both adult and youth members. The recipients must have served a minimum of 7 years as a volunteer for eligibility.

If you know a dedicated adult working with your local chapter, bethel or assembly who meets the requirements, consider suggesting that their organization nominate them. The deadline for nominations is set for October 15th, 2017. All nominations are to be kept secret, as we would like the recipient to be surprised and honored by the selection. to those around them. Throughout the year, chapters will compete in the Chase for the DeMolay Membership Cup, with the winner receiving a plaque and recognition at Convention 2018.
